Kilauea continually molds Hawaii's Big Island. Creating new land, shaping ancient forests and carving tunnels through the earth, the volcano fascinates a dedicated group of scientists and filmmakers who follow its every action. Using innovative new imaging technologies to map the magma chamber, following the lava's heat along its journey underground, and listening to the constant noises of its movements, geologists map the shifting liquid earth as they work to understand its awesome force.



SUPER FISH

Marine biologist and award-winning filmmaker Rick Rosenthal set out to capture on film the biggest, fastest, most dangerous game fish in the sea — the ancient creatures known as billfish.

The largest of all billfish is the marlin. They top speeds of 60 miles an hour on migrations that can span 9,000 miles. The largest, always female, weigh in at over 1,000 pounds, and are known as "granders." Ernest Hemingway immortalized the grander in *The Old Man and the Sea*, the story of an elderly fisherman locked in a life and death struggle with this apex predator. To Hemingway's great disappointment, he himself never landed a grander, although his novella captures the impact of this huge and graceful creature.



ARTIC BEARS

Out of an Ice Age emerged one of our most majestic creatures — the polar bear. From its brown bear ancestry, the predator evolved to be a master of a harsh and unwelcoming ice kingdom. And so is the polar bear's fate.

One of the most violent natural disasters of our time, the colossal eruption of Mt. St. Helens in 1980 blasted away an entire mountainside. A lone ecologist, Charlie Crisafulli, spent months in the blast zone and was astonished and puzzled by how quickly plants and animals colonized the wasteland. The Ghost Front - Episode 6

By December 1944, Americans have become weary of the war their young men have been fighting for three long years; the stream of newspaper headlines telling of new losses and telegrams bearing bad news from the War Department seem endless and unendurable. In the Pacific, American progress has been slow and costly, with each island more fiercely defended than the last. In Europe, no one is prepared for the massive counterattack Hitler launches on December 16 in the Ardennes Forest in Belgium and Luxemburg.

A World Without War - Episode 7

On August 6, 1945, under orders from President Truman, an American plane drops a single atomic bomb on the city of Hiroshima, obliterating 40,000 men, women and children in an instant; 100,000 more die of burns and radiation within days (another 100,000 will succumb to radiation poisoning over the next five years). Two days later, Russia declares war against Japan. On August 9, a second American atomic bomb destroys the city of Nagasaki, and the rulers of Japan decide at last to give up - and the greatest cataclysm in history comes to an end. In the following months and years, millions of young men return home - to pick up the pieces of their lives and to try to learn how to live in a world without war.

The film provides only a small window into the much larger experience of the hundreds of thousands who have served during times of war. This area represents 100 square miles of coral reefs, mangrove shoreline and grass flats, which extend from the shores of Key Largo 20 nautical miles south to the Gulf Stream and west to the middle keys. This living coral reef system is home to thousands of species of marine life that use the corals irregular topography as an ideal place to shelter them. As for the corals themselves, the warm waters rich in nutrients provide nourishment to support their slow growth. The clear warm waters and the splendid colors of the marine life have attracted millions of people to this area.

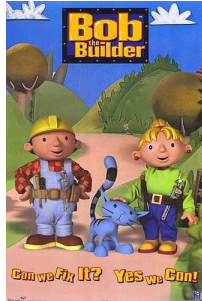
